

This is the second year of our 5-year strategic plan for 2018-23. This year our team worked on multiple strategies to deepen impact.

We built clarity on how our work must create meaningful opportunities for young people to develop and practice social-emotional competencies, while build a caring, compassionate, and inclusive ecosystem around them in their school, family, and community.

We reorganised ourselves to build a collective leadership framework, where a team of directors is now leading other collectives of teams.

Our SEL programme marched ahead at full steam, and our whole-school SEL Project Khoj, developed a SEL-integrated school design for academic, physical and social-emotional development for children in partnership with parents and caregivers.



We formalised our R&D and Advocacy verticals to accelerate SEL-based research from the Indian context and build a larger voice for SEL in the educational ecosystem.

And we wish to do all of this in partnership with and guidance from several amazing individuals and organisations, government and private, to be able to do this work together.

With a focus on our values of excellence, staying grounded, openness to learning, and cooperation, team Apni Shala is excited to engage with a diverse set of stakeholders in our journey.



While discussing the theme of managing emotions in grade 5, the students had to develop their own strategies that they have been using or will use to manage their own emotions.

A student came to me and asked, "Didi, is it a strategy if I talk to my sister when she is not able to manage her emotions?"

I asked her how she would be able to gauge if her sister is having difficulties in managing her emotions.

She replied, "She usually becomes very quiet and does not play with me. I have seen that whenever I go and sit next to her and talk to her, she will tell me what is wrong and then we will talk about it or play and forget it. She does the same for me too because I cry a lot when I am not able to express what I am feeling. So we both help each other with this strategy of sitting together, right?"

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

SEL Program

SEL sessions in MCGM schools to address children's mental wellbeing needs

We partnered with 18 MCGM schools to conduct 3384 SEL-focussed workshops with children from grades 4 to 9.

Through a diverse set of experiential learning methods, children learned ways to build the 5 key SEL skills namely Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, and Decision Making. Apni Shala's curriculum is based on Collaborative of Academic, Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL) framework. It is further informed by Narrative Practices, Diversity & Inclusion, Growth Mindset and Constructivist Learning Theory.







Social Awareness Initiatives

Grade 7 students worked on their research projects to understand the problem and issues in-depth and worked on possible solutions. Some of the Social Awareness Program topics were: Water Wastage, Child Marriage, Tree Cutting, Domestic Violence, Sexual Harassment, Water Wastage, Pollution, Fighting in the Community, and Gender Stereotypes.

SEL Workshops for NGOs

SEL Workshops are more intentional and customised, they are designed as per the needs of the partner organization. Some of the themes covered in the month of October are: Conflict Resolution, Team work, Emotions and Empathy, Individual Differences, Diversity, Relationships, and Peer Support

Khoj Community Learning Center

Khoj Community Learning Center (Khoj) is Apni Shala's initiative to create a space for high-quality education for children in Govandi/Mankhurd area. Khoj aims to become a model space for professional development and research set in the Indian context for integrated curriculum and pedagogy for whole-school SEL integration while continuing to serve children in Lallubhai Compound with a high-quality education. Khoj is designed on the principles of Concept-based Curriculum, Multicultural Education, and Community Development.

This year we served 78 students and their families, and added one more grade to our center - we now serve Junior Kg to Grade 1! Khoj also engaged 18 youth through our weekly Youth Project, an SEL initiative for youth in Lallubhai Compound and surrounding neighbourhoods. We continued our annual collaboration with the American School of Bombay for cross-community learning, as well as Sports Events, Professional Development of our teachers, and constantly upgrading our work to include the latest educational approaches for holistic learning.



Most memorable at Khoj this year

Khana Khazana

Khoj Community Learning Center hosted this year's Food Fest organised by the students themselves. They created budget-friendly, nutritious and healthy alternatives. All ideas were generated by the students and they were seen taking lead in the process of making the food. This also falls into the health and hygiene unit of the school curriculum and it was wonderful to see how the students negotiated prices and generously offered the food they had prepared.



Art Festival

The Khoj team organised a day-long Art Fest for students, caregivers, volunteers, and supporters. Students showcased their learning through art and activities for visitors! Children painted the walls of their corridors. It was their idea to do this for the festival because in their word "art can beautify any space". Based on their skill-levels, children painted patterns, blocks, or animals on walls. And caregivers joined in too!



Personal and Professional Development

Smiling Schools Project: Training 100+ MCGM teachers

Apni Shala partnered with Project Mumbai in their Smiling School Project and we facilitated Mental Health Awareness sessions to over 100 MCGM teachers where they learned about Mental Health and Social-Emotional Learning Framework.



We spent the year with teachers at the Nashik Cambridge School to create professional development opportunities related to Social Emotional Learning and Diversity Shala for them. Teachers discussed concepts of inclusion, gender, and identity and how they are interlinked with mental health.

Integrating Mindfulness, Narrative Practices and Inclusion with SEL

Our SEL curriculum has been an amalgamation of several concepts such as Constructivism and Concept-Based Learning. Our partnerships with Ummeed Child Development Center, Inner Space Counselling Centre and other organizations specialized in mental wellbeing and development have helped us integrate powerful practices such as Narrative Practice and Mindfulness.

Our trainings on Child Development, Brain Development, ADHD, Autism, and Learning disabilities has led us to be inclusive and work with the neurodiversity that exists in any classroom.



Creating Climate for SEL Advocacy in Schools: Mental Health Awareness Month Campaigns

A key part of promoting the importance of mental wellbeing in children, is ensuring schools are invested in conversations on mental health. Every month, we conducted a SEL-focussed campaign to create a mental health-friendly climate in our MCGM partner schools. Learning disability, Self-Care, Relationships were some of our monthly themes that educators would get together to have conversations about. During Mental Health Awareness Month on October 10, all our facilitators celebrated World Mental Health Day with school teachers.

'Weaving our Voices' Conference Training

Apni Shala facilitators provided trainings to participants at the "2nd International Narrative Conference - Weaving Our Voices" unpacking topics of gender, responding to youth's "problem stories" and using poetry to create connections between people.

COVID-19 Response

The rapid spread of COVID-19 brought down sudden closures on all fronts and, like for the world, significantly impacted our flow of work. The Maharashtra government declared the closure of schools starting March 16, 2020, followed by an announcement of a complete nation-wide lockdown from March 25, 2020, by the Central government.

Immediate Response

- All team members worked from home until 31st March, in line with our policy.
- In the first week, the office premises were open as some of our team members who come from low-income homes found it safer and adequate space to be in. However, all were advised to travel during least-crowded hours and follow all safety procedures while in office.
- Major events, training, and initiatives were either canceled or postponed for later.
- Stakeholders were informed immediately.
- Office space was sanitized and other resources were made available.
- Any Covid-19 related wellness leave was offered as "leave with pay" and was not deducted from the team's existing pool of wellness leaves.
- Elaborate guidelines and helpline details were shared with the team and stakeholders.
- These two weeks were utilized for online professional development and documentation and reporting by the team.

Plan Ahead for 2020/21

As new information shaped up the larger realities, the Apni Shala team worked with key stakeholders including our board, our donors, government officials, and school principals to make a rightful assessment of the situation. Based upon this the strategic plan for 2020-21 was re-evaluated. Our commitment to the schools and communities remained our high priority, along with ensuring job-safety for the team. Our programming in 2020/21 will reflect these priorities.
